department, library board, or senior board. Since receiving the first tax levy payment in 2018, SCDDB has spent over \$1.55 million in local agency funding and individual funding, developed Day Services and Residential Services prógrams and supports 170 individuals and their families.

In 2022, SCDDB acquired 11 acres of land adjacent to Gibson Technical School in Reeds Spring. After a 2-year search for land that fit our needs and was in budget, SCDDB purchased the centrally-located land for \$382,000 cash. Plans include building office space and additional

areas for our residents developmental disabilities to learn job skills, increase independence, and quality of life, and engage with the Stone County community. SCDDB is currently pursuing grants and additional funding sources to pay for the building project. SCDDB takes seriously our responsibility to build a sustainable organization to serve many future generations of Stone County families, and we take great care to be fiscally responsible with every dollar we receive.

### SCDDB'S PROGRESS: 2016 - 2023



Stone County voters overwhelmingly pass SB40 (Disability Board) Tax Levy, establishing SCDDB to provide services and supports for Stone County residents. At this time, limited services are available.



Stone County Commission appoints 9 volunteer board members who spend the next year developing the business structure of SCDDB.



First payment of the new tax levy is made to SCDDB, allowing the Board to seek out non-profit agencies to fund.



SCDDB hires its first employee, an Executive Director, to manage day-to-day operations. SCDDB begins funding OATS Transportation and other partner agencies.



With limited options in the Stone County area, SCDDB chooses to pursue licensing with DMH to provide Medicaid-funded services. SCDDB develops a day program that is 100% community-based, "without walls", to support individuals to live their BEST LIFE, as they see it, in their community.



DMH approves SCDDB's contract to provide services and first participant receives direct support. By the end of 2020, the day program will have over 40 participants, far exceeding the expected need, and SCDDB will have 20 administrative and direct support staff.



SCDDB pursues DMH licensing for Residential ISL (Individualized Supported Living) services. With the goal of supporting people in their community, SCDDB leases homes throughout the County and provides staff to support residents to be independent and live the life they choose.



DMH approves Residential ISL licensing for SCDDB. Day Services reaches 50 participants.



SCDDB moves first resident into ISL program. Second resident moves in shortly thereafter. To support both programs, staffing increases to 30 full-time positions.



SCDDB moves third resident into ISL services and funds other services for over 80 additional individuals. SCDDB employs 28 Direct Support Professionals and 8 administrative staff.

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## **OUR FUTURE**

The Developmental Disability tax levy will be on the ballot for renewal on April 4, 2023. If passed by Stone County voters once again, this levy will remain in place to provide vital services and supports for people with developmental disabilities (and their families) for generations to come.

If not passed, SCDDB will be unable to fund services like OATS, CHANCES of Stone County, sports programs, camp scholarships, individual needs, and many other supports people have come to depend on.

Estimates show approximately 330 additional people currently need services in Stone County. SCDDB's future plans includes adding Medicaid-funded services like Supported Employment and Behavioral Health, building affordable housing, purchasing wheelchair-accessible transportation, and supporting medically fragile individuals.

SCDDB values the trust placed in it by the residents of Stone County and looks forward to growing to meet the needs of this community!



## **FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS**

#### WHAT DOES IT COST PROPERTY OWNERS?

SCDDB is not allowed to collect more than ten cents per \$100 assessed valuation. The average property owner currently pays between \$25-35 annually.

#### WILL THIS MAKE MY TAX BILL GO UP?

Not at all! This is just a renewal, not a new tax.

#### IF MONEY COMES FROM MEDICAID, WHY AM I ASKED TO **PAY AS WELL?**

Medicaid-funded services include our Day Program and Residential Program. The tax levy pays for funding to partner agencies like CHANCES of Stone County and OATS for transportation, as well as individual funding for items and services people may need due to their disability that are not covered by Medicaid. The tax levy also allows us to maintain administrative support for all of our programs and services.
